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LETTER FROM THE DIOCESAN SPIRITUAL DIRECTOR

A CELEBRATION OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

In the ABM Pew Reflection for the Day of Pentecost, we are told:
"On Pentecost Sunday, we generally say we celebrate the coming of the
Holy Spirit. However, what we do not openly recognize is that the Holy



Spirit has always existed. When we read in John 15: 26, 'When the Advocate comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who comes from the Father, he will testify on my behalf,' we are basically referred back to John 1:1 'In the beginning was the Word' – This says that the Lord Jesus has always been and refers to the eternal self-existence of Jesus before He became flesh as noted in John 1:14. It is equally true that the Holy Spirit has always existed and been active in the affairs of the world along with God the Father, and God the Son. These events all occurred before the manifestation of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. That is what we celebrate on the day of Pentecost – the manifestation or revealing of the Holy Spirit to the Apostles."

Luke's account of the day of Pentecost in the 2nd chapter of Acts is very familiar to us all – even if some of the place names are hard to get our tongues around! Before his ascension, Jesus told his disciples to stay in Jerusalem and wait for the Holy Spirit. When they became filled with the Holy Spirit a couple of days later, their transformation was immediate and lasting. The most obvious and outward effect was that the disciples were able to speak in other languages – without any preparation or sermon notes. Inwardly, the Spirit helped, taught, convicted of sin and brought peace. This outpouring of the Spirit is for EVERYONE. Jesus' earthly ministry was complete. The Holy Spirit came – not to replace Jesus – but to work a parallel role as guide, comforter and counselor; so that ALL of us, down through the centuries, could have the benefit of God's presence in Our lives.

The Holy Spirit helps us to be strong, is always with us (even if we don't or can't recognise his presence), shows us the way, teaches us everything we need to know to follow Jesus, and helps us remember what Jesus has said. Like the disciples on that first day of Pentecost, who were filled by the Holy Spirit to overflowing so that they could do nothing else but tell others about Jesus, we too will not be able to keep all the amazing good news inside of us. The Holy Spirit will help us to respond excitedly to the wonders of our Lord.

HAMBURGERS AND MILKSHAKES. John Dickson tells a story we may have read in his book, "Promoting the Gospel" which is worth taking in again:

"Through my teenage years the biggest influence on my life was not my football coach, who could kick me off the team, or my Kung Fu master, who could kick my butt, but a middle-aged volunteer at the school who taught "Scripture" once a week. In Australia one relic of Christendom in government schools is a one-hour lesson about religion. It is serviced by volunteers, not teachers, (which made it infinitely more attractive than officially supervised "non-Scripture"). The Scripture-teaching women—they were usually elderly women—had no authority, and so it was often a free-for-all.

At 15 I had no intention of attending church or of taking religion seriously. My upbringing was loving but completely god-less. My Scripture teacher had the courage one day to invite the class for discussions at her home on Friday afternoons. She promised hamburgers, milkshakes and scones. A group of us took her up on

the offer, thinking that a few minutes of God-talk was a small price to pay for free and copious food. In that lounge room on those Friday afternoons were the class clown and bully, a petty thief, drug users and sellers, and various other kinds of happy pagans. She showed us quite extravagant patience and hospitality, put up with having her video cassette recorder stolen one week and even housed one of our totally inebriated mates in her beautiful suburban mansion following a drunken Year 10 party around the corner. The influence of Mrs Weldon on the direction of my life is lasting. It was an influence totally without authority, full of persuasion and example."

READING MATTERS

It is interesting to receive articles from members on what they have seen or studied. Please share your studies on how we may grow our faith through the Cursillo principles. Here are some thoughts on SRE as Apostolic Action, which we here present for your interest and further thoughts.

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION. In Queensland critics have fought against the right of Scripture volunteers to 'teach' or 'educate', and it is officially called RI; Religious Instruction. In that state attempts are being made to take it out of the school hours, and only allow it in lunch times or after school as already happens in Victoria.



SPECIAL RELIGIOUS EDUCATION. In NSW the hour supposedly allowed is mostly half an hour per class. It seems our Special Religious Education Scripture volunteers are making good use of that very short time, often in the lazy afternoons. Children hear the Good News they may never otherwise hear in today's post-modern generations.

THREE GOOD BOOKS for study and action in our Christian faith are recommended:

The first is "Simply Jesus": Who he was, what he did, why it matters, by Tom Wright, which puts new and scriptural focus on the Person we talk about and teach to others.

The second is *"A Little Book about a Big Story"*, by a previous Assistant Bishop of Newcastle Diocese, Graeme Rutherford, which helpfully outlines the pathways of our faith over the years.

The third book is "Humilitas" A Lost Key to Life, Love and Leadership, by John Dickson. In this book he proposes that humility makes the great even greater in achieving their goals and abilities to inspire, influence and persuade people. In changing their environments, they bring harmony to the telling and to the hearing of their message.

I am grateful for the opportunity to serve as a Secretariat member this year and have already begun the learning process.

I grew up in Taree and attended St John's there until I finished school and headed to Sydney. PENTECOST FIRE

Pentecost was first a Jewish festival day. In pre-biblical days, the ancient Israelites marked the beginning of the reaping season with a harvest festival—later, after the exile in Egypt, to be called Passover. The close of this season was held as a "a week of weeks" 50 days after Passover on 'Pentecost' (taken from the Greek for the fiftieth day 'Pentecoste')

Later, Pentecost became associated with the delivery of the Laws of Moses, the Ten Commandments, to the Israelites—in a sense the founding of the Jewish "church".

It was on this founding day that the Jewish disciples of Jesus gathered after the resurrection. But, with the coming of the fire of the Holy Spirit, they became more than just followers: they

became missionaries preaching the good news.

Their Jewish festival, then, took on new meaning for them as they were inspired to speak, and those of many nations were inspired to understand.

For Christians, therefore, Pentecost is a time of commencement, not conclusion. Historically, Jesus' physical life on earth had ended but the life of the Body of Christ, his Church, had just begun, for the warming breath of the Spirit of Truth animated the assembled disciples into Apostles of Christ.

A question:

What do you do with the Cursillo Monthly Prayer Cycle page in The Encourager?

Is it tucked away in your bible, prayer diary, beside your bed or wherever you spend your quiet time with God? Do you use it daily? Regularly? Or when it falls out at your feet?

What is the point of the monthly prayer cycle?

On each day of the month, we pray for particular parts or people of the Cursillo movement. The aim of this monthly cycle of prayer is to provide a focus for daily prayer, with a different part featuring as the daily focus of prayer once each month. Its purpose is to draw Cursillistas into greater awareness of, and fellowship with, one another through daily intercession.

It also helps to make us aware that we belong to the wider family of Cursillo.

Prayer is such a powerful force. We can tend to underestimate its power.
Prayer can move mountains if only we would let it. If only we would realise just how powerful prayer can be, we would never feel hopeless and together we could make a great difference.

We all need to expand our circle of prayers out from ourselves, our family and friends. You are being called upon to pray for other people – including people whom you have never met.

The power of prayer does not flow from us; it is not special words we say or the special way we say them or even how often we say them. The power of prayer is not based on a certain direction we face or a certain position of our bodies. The power of prayer does not come from the use of artifacts, icons, candles or beads although they may help you focus. The power of prayer comes from the omnipotent One who hears our prayers and answers them. Prayer places us in contact with Almighty God. Whatever the answer to our prayers, the God to whom we pray is the source of the power of prayer, and He can and will answer us, according to His perfect will and timing.

So, this month let's all make a commitment to consciously use this prayer cycle and see what God has in store for us. As Father Steve says we need to pray about it more than we talk about it. De Colores & Ultreya
