FROM OUR DIOCESAN SPIRITUAL DIRECTOR

FASTING, FORTY DAYS AND FORGIVENESS

In Genesis 3 the first sin is recorded and also the subsequent judgement by GOD. As the human capacity for sin is not reduced in any way, GOD determines to wipe out humanity from His creation. Noah is instructed to build an ark to survive the ensuing flood. GOD intends to begin again with Noah and make a new covenant with him – to never again destroy the earth by flood. Covenants always have signs; and, in this case, GOD commits Himself to the sign of the rainbow.

Noah and his family were saved by water – symbolising baptism as a symbol of GOD's grace. It saves us now and acts as a sign of GOD's promise of ultimate salvation. The risen CHRIST, sitting at the right hand of GOD, is ample reassurance – better even than a rainbow in the sky.

After 40 days of fasting and prayer in the desert, JESUS confronted temptations to deny His mission and emerged with a much clearer commitment to His mission.

In the Bible, the number 40 is used to represent a time of preparation and cleansing. It takes 40 days for GOD to cleanse the earth of evil in the story of Noah's ark. The Israelites wander in the desert for 40 years before they are ready to truly embrace their identity as GOD's chosen people. JESUS fasts and prays for 40 days in the desert so that He might be fully prepared for His ministry and for doing the will of His Father.

During those 40 days JESUS who is fully divine, was tempted by the devil. Being also fully human, Church teaching declares that JESUS was "like us in all things except sin." Temptation doesn't become sin until we give in to it. JESUS never did. When we struggle to do what is right in the face of powerful temptation to do wrong, we can take comfort in knowing that JESUS knows exactly what the experience is like. Lent is a time for us to recognise that we can turn away from sin and resist temptations.

JESUS' mission as He comes out of the desert calls people to repent because GOD the Father is about to transform the universe. The Kingdom of GOD is all of creation after it has been cleansed by GOD of evil and sin. All those who want to be a part of this joyous new world must allow the, Spirit that led JESUS into the desert to enter into their hearts. It will be challenging – but just think how much more joyful and stronger we will be spiritually on Easter morning as we celebrate that our LORD is risen.

English artist, Stanley Spencer, painted a picture of JESUS sitting on the desert sands with a small but deadly scorpion – suggesting, perhaps, that the really dangerous beasts are those small ones that can slither insidiously into our lives – the persistent sins and small infidelities that, almost unnoticed, can inject a paralysing venom into our discipleship.

JESUS comes out from His wilderness experience strengthened for His mission. On Ash Wednesday, we were signed as baptised disciples of the tempted One and called to Lenten mindfulness of the struggle between sin and grace.

The desert sand is not under our feet but in our hearts. Its grit is the daily irritations and indefinable loneliness we often feel – like an oyster producing a pearl. Lent heightens our awareness of the importance of uncluttered spiritual and physical space where we can recognise our pain, where we can discover the beauty of GOD and our sisters and brothers under the surface sands of our busy lives – and – where we can allow our ears to be unclogged by closer listening to the Word of GOD. What spiritual baggage do we need to discard in our trek towards Easter? What will be our pearl of great price as we journey towards the cross – which as the great evangelist Billy Graham always said is at the centre of our faith?

May GOD bless you this Easter.




Both Bart and Leslie where longstanding members of the Lake Macquarie Servant Community, and led one of the Continuing the Journey weekends.

PASTORAL LETTER

For over a year now, Covid 19 has been at the centre of a lot of our thoughts, conversations and actions, which of course is the needed response to a deadly virus that's taken the lives of over 2 million people worldwide. But this does not change the need for putting Christ at the centre of all that we do; for our Lord asks us to seek God's kingdom above all else (Matthew. 6:33). This is a kingdom in which God rules from a throne of love in a closer relationship to us than we are to ourselves and, knowing our deepest longings and desires, He draws us into taking part in activities and prayers for the glory and extension of His kingdom.

We have all come to know the power of Cursillo weekends and their ability to focus the light of God's kingdom of love into the very hearts of its participants, providing them with experiences that can sometimes be life changing. But at the end of the day, it's always the Cursillistas on team who make it work, as they provide people doing their Cursillo with a loving example of what it means to be a member of the Body of Christ. Each of the team members have usually paid for their own weekend expenses but, because things aren't getting any cheaper, from now on the Secretariat would like to give people the opportunity to contribute financially to team member's accommodation and living expenses.

And while this of course is a request for money, the benefits will be more than financial by providing us with another means of working together as the body of Christ.

Cursillo is a worldwide movement and more information on the history and foundation of the movement in Australia can be found on our website https://www.cursillo-australia.org/ In 2019 Australia had the great joy of introducing the movement to Hong Kong and Archbishop Matthias Der has been so supportive, recognising the spiritual growth of those participating and encouraging and supporting a translation into Cantonese so his native speaking flock can benefit from the Cursillo weekend.

I am prayerfully asking that you give an opportunity to one of our Cursillistas in your Parish to speak to your congregation of the joy and privilege of being a Cursillista and to encourage them to become the hands and feet of our Master fulfilling the Great Commission.

How do people see God through us? I've been asking myself questions, and sharing in Group Reunion Piety, Study and Apostolic Action, about how I witness to the people I meet, the people around me. I think we can't command how people should witness, except to act on Jesus' two great commandments, "Love God and love others." **D**o I see sharing the good news as a task? **O**r as sharing my redeemed life with them; **A**m I thinking how busy I am? **O**r mindful of the situation I am in; **D**o I neglect opportunities of sharing the good news, fail to share a graced word or action? **O**r am I watching/listening to people from my two square metres?

In our Zoom Bible Study of Mark chapter 7, our group read that the Pharisees let go of the commands of God and held onto human traditions. Jesus' frustration with them reminded me of Bryce Courtenay's frustration with some of his son's doctors' traditional old-school rules for the poor treatment of his haemophilia. His book, April Fools Day, and Jesus' words come close in helping me to think positively through our own son's illness and courage. Another daily read, the book of Esther, has been a good series for me in showing the quiet obedience and courage Esther needed from God to help save her fellow Jews in Persia; as is our obedience for the seekers around us.

In learning apostolic action I saw how making a macramé shoulder bag could help me understand the patience and peacefulness I need in witnessing to God's work as I go about. My mother started this bag before she lost her sight to macular degeneration by 2000, and I inherited it when she died in 2006. There are 80 strings worked in 20 knots across each row. Mum had done 30 rows; during Covid I took it up again. I can see where her work finished, and have now done about the same amount, row by row, or even half a row. But each and every knot gets me closer to the finished article. I think each loving word, question and action can also add up to God drawing people to himself.

I joined a dressmaking class at Gosford Sewing Centre. I knew no one except the teacher whom I met when I delivered my machine to be repaired. I went to class with a prayer about what would happen and decided to at least introduce myself and ask names and where from. I felt a great joy that I found all the women very different and yet very willing to share themselves. While we work together and notice each other in class, God's giving me opportunities to allow him to shine through me and recognise his light in each classmate! Using hands to sew is just one of *my* things; for others, it might be a women's group at church; or for men, joining a Men's Shed; or some community interest; God in Jesus, through the Holy Spirit is encouraging me to be consistently more present to those around me, to feel loved and loving; and forgiven when I miss opportunities.

KAIROS PRISON MINISTRY A WINDOW TO WHAT IS HAPPENING THROUGH THE "EYES" OF ST HELIERS, MUSWELLBROOK.

Like most ministries there have been challenges in the last year because of the COVID restrictions. The "Back to the Future" cartoon probably aligns with many of our feelings!

Our first experience was the cancellation of our Journey Day in March last year. We have not been able to enter St Heliers since then. Not only did this mean no further Journey Days, but also no Short Course for the year.



This has been difficult for us and for the inmates.

Our Committee at its last meeting in February was very grateful that the Prison Chaplain, Scott Kelly, was able to come and update us on the present situation.

An important point for us was the reassurance that Kairos is missed.

He made the following points which we believe help us to look to return; and give us a prayer focus.

Scott made a number of points:

- Corrective Services is responsible for the safety of inmates.
- Only 1 case of COVID has been reported in NSW prisons (Parklea).
- Practices include stringent testing and isolation.
- In-person visits were stopped. Additional phone calls were provided for inmates, but when AV calls were permitted, unfortunately the technology at St Heliers did not support it.
- Recently family visits have been restored, but no touching 50 minutes personal visits.
- BUT there is the possibility of opportunity to return for a Journey Day. However no indication of a date.
- There was discussion of the DRAFT COVID Safe plan recently prepared. Some possibilities, including use of veranda were raised.

- Short Course is not a possibility at this time. This means that we are unable to select a team and begin formation training until we have a definite date.
- He concluded his remarks by again reassuring us that Kairos is missed at St Heliers by both staff and inmates.

There are many issues facing Kairos, as with other ministries. However, a significant challenge for Kairos, not only at St Heliers, is to recruit more volunteers for the ongoing ministry. Cursillo (both Anglican and Catholic) has been important in this regard in the past as well as Emmaus. Plans are in being put in place to arrange a number of information meetings across the Diocese. A prayer point indeed.

We are "planning ahead"; and are very encouraged by KOW (Kairos Outside for Women) in the Hunter who are now in training for their weekend program in April (16, 17 and 18) at Catalina.

We do give thanks to God for the service given over the years and for the opportunities of this ministry in the future. Your prayers are a blessing too!
